Chair Report

In 2022 INHAT distributed \$1.4m to support the humanitarian work of the International Needs Network. This is significant increase from the \$1.06m distributed in 2021.

With the impact of COVID reducing around the world, our network partners were able to return their focus to their core activities of education, health & sanitation, economic empowerment, and human rights.

This report provides a summary of some of the inspiring work undertaken by the network. Through the generosity of our New Zealand supporters, we have been part of the work which has seen 13,000 children supported in their education and 8000 women empowered economically through vocational training.

While we are not a disaster relief organisation, our International Needs network partners in Bulgaria, Romania and Slovakia were deeply moved by the plight of Ukrainian refugees. They moved quickly to provide short term aid support and have continued caring for displaced people throughout the year. It is yet another example of the wisdom of the founders of International Needs who believed that locals are best placed to impact the communities they live in. Local leaders were able to respond in an agile way to rapidly changing conditions ensure that help went to those that need it the most.

Thank you to the staff of International Needs New Zealand and the Trustees of the International Needs NZ Humanitarian Trust for all your hard work in 2022.

Director Report

I am pleased to present the Director's Report for the INHAT Impact Report for 2022. This report highlights the various initiatives undertaken by our partners during this period, their impact, and the future plans that they have for continuing their mission, in transforming lives and changed communities.

During the year, our partners in over 15 countries undertook many initiatives with the aim of improving the lives of the people they serve. Some of the key development included:

- · Several freshwater wells in Uganda and Nepal
- · Support of local medical facilities and medical intervention for hundreds of children
- · Support of more than 1,800 students to be educated across nine countries.
- Empowering over 800 women through vocational training, equipping, and resourcing them to start their own business or find employment.
- · Advocate for justice by supporting entities in the prevention of trafficking of women and children.
- Support of refugees and victims of the Ukraine war and other natural disasters like the Tongan Volcanic eruption.

A lot of the initiatives that our partners undertook have had a positive impact on the communities, seeing many lives being transformed.

I would also like to acknowledge the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade for their ongoing support in the Solo Mothers vocational training program in Fiji. Whilst we are pleased with the impact that our partners had, we understand and recognize that there is still much work to be done.

I would also like to thank all the staff and volunteers of International Needs New Zealand for their hard work and dedication in achieving our mission, which have made it possible for us to make a positive impact on the lives of the people we serve. I look forward to continuing our work and achieving even greater impact in the future.


Financial Review


The mission of International Needs is to transform lives and change communities. We do this by partnering everyday New Zealanders with indigenous leaders to make a difference in their communities. During 2022, International Needs Humanitarian Aid Trust supported a number of initiatives that were locally led and inspired. These initiatives impacted thousands of people and many communities across nineteen nations. This included but was not limited to:

- Supporting students though the International Needs Child Assistance
 Program
- Health & Sanitation
- Education and advocacy on social issues and injustices around the world
- Human Rights & supporting victims of trafficking
- Economic empowerment and vocational skills based training
- Aid support and support to victims of war and disasters

INNZ acts on behalf of International Needs Humanitarian Aid Trust. This trust is responsible for fundraising and supporting several humanitarian and development projects across 19 countries around the world. In 2022, INNZ helped to raise over \$1.28 million dollars in support of development work such as child education and sponsorship, clean water and health initiatives, social justice advocacy, building of new wells, women's empowerment and micro finance loans, vocational skills training, support refugees and victims of natural disasters and war.



Overall Revenue

During the year International Needs Humanitarian Aid Trust raised over \$1.28 million dollars to support worldwide initiatives. In the financial year of 2022, over \$1.39 million was sent to our international partners working in 19 countries. This impacted over 300,000 people through local initiatives to support community development programs.


Programs such as education of children and marginalised women, setting up livelihood programs for vulnerable families, health and sanitation, human rights and social justice advocacy and to promote and support economic empowerment activities. Through the kindness and generosity of many, support was also provided to Ukrainian refugees and victims of the Tongan volcanic eruption.

International Needs Humanitarian Aid Trust outsources all its administrative function to International Needs New Zealand (INNZ), therefore does not account for income or expenses. Government support through the ongoing support by the New Zealand Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade, over \$43,620 was given in 2022 in support of the Solo Mothers program, run by International Needs Fiji.

Aid Support

Ukraine refugees, one year on

The war has raged on for over a year now, with no end in sight. Our IN partners in Bulgaria, Romania and Slovakia continue to assist Ukrainian refugees now faced with piecing together their fractured lives in a foreign country.

For our IN partners it has been difficult to offer hope when the emotional wounds inflicted by war run so deeply. In addition to providing pastoral care, IN Romania has set up small groups where refugees can share their burdens and receive bespoke counselling. Recognising there are no quick fixes options for extending professional counselling support is a focus in the coming months.

IN Bulgaria is working to meet essential needs for refugees, both in their direct care, and those living independently throughout the wider community. Opportunities for schooling, as well as initiatives to help restore dignity and connection with both fellow Ukrainians and the local community, have been the focus in recent months.

Meanwhile, for those required to remain in the Ukraine, IN Slovakia continues to provide at least one humanitarian aid convoy every two months. These are loaded with nutritious food and other essential items.





Partnering with local leaders connected to communities, who at times need short-term aid support, enables us to act in times of need.

Whilst our partners do not directly engage in disaster relief, they do seek opportunities to ensure aid can be provided in times of need. This includes distributing food parcels to feed a hungry family or provide simple measures like wash stations to help prevent the spread of viruses or disease.

Providing short term food aid to victims, refugees and families affected by disasters such as floods or earthquakes and other basic human needs, is a way INHAT responds to those in need.

INHAT's main focus is toward development. We believe in following a process that creates growth, progress and positive change in the physical, spiritual, economic, environmental, social and demographic component of each of our partners' supported programs.

Education



We passionately believe child sponsorship is a powerful tool in child development, and we're committed to walking with children as they reach their full potential, ensuring they are known, loved and protected. International Needs supports over 13,000 children in nine countries through the International Needs Child Assistance Program. We believe every child deserves the right to an education and it is only through education that we will see the plight of poverty be lifted from this world. Education is the cornerstone to providing families and individuals with the tools and means to maximise their God given abilities and to break away from the bondage of poverty

Bangladesh 900+ children supported through INCAP across 4 schools. The drop-in centre continues to see on average 35 children in bonded labour each day receive basic education, a hot meal and clean clothing. India 300+ children supported to attend school or online learning in areas of Siliguri and Dehradun. **Philippines** 350+ students supported across many regions. Thousands of other children helped through community social outreach programs.

400+ students across three school are being supported in Uganda. New furniture, books and refurbished classrooms were provided to help encourage and motivate learning

In partnership with Ark Quest School, 150+ children are provided with education.





Impact Story

For over 20 years, IN Bangladesh has been running a drop-in centre for street children of Dhaka City. Not only do they currently provide education, a hot meal as well as other essential supplies for over 200 children that live in the slums, but also now intervene in providing the same level of care for children that are in bonded labour. Over 40 children that are in bonded labour now attend the drop in centre. Not only do they get a hot nutritious meal, but are also provided with a simple education, medical intervention (if needed) and clothing. This centre provides dignity to those children who are most in need and through education, the team are advocating on the children's behalf to the business owner to release them.







Health & Sanitation

International Needs supports local indigenous leaders to provide access to basic healthcare.

When a person has access to basic healthcare, safe drinking water, and sanitation, everything about their life is improved.

International Needs works to provide access to basic healthcare, clean water, sanitation, and hygiene education to communities where vulnerable people live.

The need is great, and resources are scarce. Support from people like you makes all this possible.

Fiji & MFAT Support

In 2018 the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade (MFAT) in partnership with INHAT started supporting the Solo Mothers Vocational Training program in Suva Fiji.

MFAT co-funded this project over a four-year term, supporting single mothers from informal settlements through various skills-based training workshops to empower them to begin their own business.

The Solo moms project captured the hearts of many New Zealanders who are encouraged that they can help make a difference to their pacific neighbours.

Each year 20 young mothers are enrolled in a five-month course that provides them with the life skills and ability to establish their own business or give them the confidence to seek suitable employment. Not only are they equipped with these life changing skills, they are also provided support through counselling, guidance, financial literacy, food hygiene and preparation, health and keeping their children safe, as well as ongoing business mentoring when they have completed their training.

Whilst the mothers learn and train, their children are well looked after by the IN FIJI day care team onsite, at the Oasis Day Care centre.

Human Rights

We believe in equality amongst all groups and freedom from discrimination. Girls and women in many countries are often viewed and treated as second class citizens. Whilst this attitude is changing in a lot of urban centres, in many rural communities, these views still persist. Many families view educating women as unnecessary and are therefore unwilling to spend money on formal education for their daughters. Often women are expected to begin work or marry and begin a family at a young age. As a result, many of these women have only basic levels of education. With a lack of education some are sold into slavery, some resort to prostitution and others beg, just to feed their children. Our partners focus on empowering local leaders to make changes to these cultural norms, to empower women and children and ensure every human is respected and is given the opportunity to a better life.

More than 50 million people are in human trafficking, an increase of 10 million people since 2016. Chab Dai is an organization within Cambodia that aims to end modern slavery. Chab Dai offers case management support, legal support, and community-based care. Human trafficking is a complex issue fueled by social inequality, gender inequality, poverty, culture, history, and economic disempowerment. Chab Dai created a programme to help combat this, the Chab Dai Legal Support Project. Beginning in 2005 this project aims to financially support lawyers to help with prosecuting those responsible for human trafficking. This project has seen 32 convictions, 96 survivors of human trafficking flown back home, 253 counselling sessions and 34 cases currently in the trial process.

Apeksha's story

Prompt intervention for 12 year old Apeksha, one of our INCAP community children, has allowed her a brighter and clearer future.

It was brought to our attention that this young girl was having eyes problems and struggling a lot in school. A visit to the Eye Specialist confined she needed assistance.

Both her eyes read +4 and a cataract had developed in her left eye due to nutrition deficiency. Medication, exercises for the eye, vitamins and glasses were provided for her.

The moment she put on her glasses she SMILED and said, "I CAN SEE BETTER!".

What a joy. Thank you for making this possible for her.


