INsight into relief for refugees

Thank you for being part of God's Salt and Light to the desperate Ukrainian people, especially innocent women and children.

Deuteronomy 10:18-19a says: "He [our God1 defends the cause of the fatherless and the widow, and loves the foreigner residing among you, giving them food and clothing. And you are to love those who are foreigners..."

Masses of Ukrainian refugees continue to flee their homes, scared for their lives and the lives of their children. They seek safe refuge, somewhere...anywhere... As the women, children and elderly cross into Romania and Slovakia our IN partners come to help.

Immediately the Romanian IN Team intervened to help in the tragic situation created on the border with Ukraine by the influx of refugees. Through their efforts, and the support of their churches, they have been able to:

- Help those waiting to cross the border with blankets, warm clothes, food, and medical support (Wait time is 24 - 48 hours outdoors in the cold and often rainy conditions).
- Take the refugees from the border area and transport them to safe locations.
- Prepare shelters for refugees in safe locations, preparing food and assisting with legal documents.
- Send emergency help to the Evangelical community in South Ukraine.







Our IN partners in Romania and Slovakia are extending God's love through immediate care and support. There is also a plan to possibly relocate an orphanage from South Kyiv to Romania.

Pavel Sinko, Executive Director on IN Slovakia writes:

"Right now, most refugees just need transportation from the border, rest, and refreshments. They stay for a night or two and require help with transportation to their destination in Slovakia or other parts of Europe. Most of them have relatives or friends somewhere. So far around 70,000 people have crossed the Slovak border. We and local churches are involved with other volunteers and humanitarian organisations ...but we are expecting many more refugees who will need to stay in Slovakia for longer...So, we, as IN Slovakia are looking for ways to help. In some areas it will be cooperation with local authorities and help with social and spiritual ministry. In some areas we will provide everything, including housing, food, social and spiritual ministry...We are also ready to open the Rackova Conference Centre for refugees..."

Indeed, there are now 50 families residing in the Rackova Centre; they each have their own room, bedding, and a safe place to stav.

Mirel Talpes, Executive Director of IN Romania writes:

"Our colleagues and staff go and cross the border into Ukraine with food, blankets, and warm clothes to offer women and children who wait more than 24 hours in the night cold to be processed. This is unsafe for them; they are freezing...[The next wave of refugees] will be mostly the poor from the South of Ukraine. As an example of our actions, together with our church planter, Florin Boruga, we work to identify and rent houses in three villages in Central Transylvania to accommodate refugees. In these villages, Florin Boruga and the other church planter from area, Cosmin Gabor, have also made ready centres where they have served food for the Roma community since 2019. When we bring refugees into these villages, these centres serve food for all families."

The needs will continue long after the media fades. Please continue to pray for strength, courage, and resources for our IN partners.

Together we can be more effective as "Salt and Light". Our vision is for a true partnership: a church in NZ partnering with a church in a developing nation. As Jesus tells us in 1 Corinthians 12:12 — "Just as a body, though one, has many parts, but all its many parts form one body, so it is with Christ."

We often wonder: how much of a difference can one person make? Or: is our little church actually able to make disciples in other nations? Jesus tells us many times and in many ways, that YES, we can, through Him. We also have a good example of how this is working through INNZ:

A group of farmers in the Waikato are proving that someone far away can be a part of a giant spiritual battle in the heart of a country far from God. The New Zealand Christian Farmers Trust has been supporting International Needs Nepal's ministry worker, Bijay, since 2009. Because of their support, Bijay has been able to spread the Gospel throughout Nepal. Last year he spoke with 440 people, and 28 of those people have come to the Lord. These statistics become more remarkable when you consider Nepal has strict anti-conversion laws which mean that spreading the Gospel is not only difficult, but dangerous. In one of his reports, Bijay highlighted a story that is all too common for ministry workers who come face to face with evil daily:

"Prem B.K, is a 38-year-old man who is part of the lower-class system in society. He was demon possessed for two months but was unaware of what burdened him. He always had negative thoughts and desired to attempt suicide. Unfortunately, one day his family members found him inside a bathroom covered in blood with his throat cut. He was rushed to the hospital just in time. After two days, he woke up and shared a horrifying incident of how he heard an inner voice tell him to commit suicide and so he cut his throat with a blade. He was troubled by the demon all the time until he cut his throat and then the demon left

The incident created an opportunity for us to share the gospel with this family. Because of God's grace, the whole family accepted Christ and a further two more families with seven members came to Jesus Christ through them, Halleluiah!

Now, through prayers, Prem is getting better and is mentally and physically recovering. He wants to learn more about his faith in Christ. His family keenly attend weekly fellowships and are helping Prem to completely recover. Furthermore, the incident gave birth to a new fellowship in that area. So, we have been conducting weekly house fellowships every Tuesday with the hope to take the gospel to the whole village in God's time."

The NZ Christian Farmers Trust are in this spiritual battle against the enemy and are winning. These farmers have got the same heart as Bijay: to spread the Gospel to the unreached.

INsight into Uganda Wash Project

IN is fortunate to have many generous supporters who use the resources God has blessed them with to be salt and light to those in need. The Uganda Wash program is such an example.

IN Water Project 2018 – 2020 gives us much to celebrate including 12,020 people in 12 villages in the Buikwe district now having access to clean water from 46 new water sources.

"Girls who were at risk because they had to walk long distances to fetch water, now feel secure since safe, clean water is within their reach, a short distance away. This takes them less time to collect water with more time to get to school. Community members, who spent a lot of funds on medical bills due to waterborne diseases, can now smile because those

diseases are no more, and they are able to have some savings. Thank you INNZ, thank you WASH." — Rev. Justus Miwanda INUG

Such success is a springboard to the next 3-year program where NZ will sponsor one of 15 village WASH projects, a village called Bbanga 2. Two hundred and four families live in Bbanga 2 and will benefit from clean water, sanitation, and hygiene.



The main aims of the WASH project at the Bbanga 2 Village are:

- Rehabilitation of 3 dysfunctional boreholes
- Construction of a new latrine block at the Pentecostal Ministries Church
- Construction and supply of pit latrines for households in the community
- Tippy Taps (hand washing) installed for household use
- Utensil drying racks and waste bin construction (pits)
- Training of adolescent girls in making re-usable pads, and menstrual hygiene management for retention in school
- Education to the village community on good hygiene and sanitation practices (community dialogues)

Capacity building has been factored into the sustained success of the project through a committee called the Water User Committee. The water committee will also be supported to establish a water source maintenance fund (raised by user households) to enable them to meet repair



costs. This will ensure that the village is able to maintain their water sources.

Jesus tells us: "Let anyone who is thirsty come to me and drink. Whoever believes in me. as Scripture has said, rivers of living water will flow from within them." John 7: 37b-38

Joining hands to end global slavery

A partnership of belief and strength....

International Needs has partnered with the Chab Dai initiative for the past five years, raising funds to help employ lawyers to prosecute suspected human traffickers.

International Needs is united with Chab Dai, working to turn the tide against human

International Needs contributes over \$30,000 a year to this valuable cause, one aimed at ending an injustice many



New Zealanders may not even realise is happening, and even fewer could comprehend for the misery and pain it inflicts upon communities.

The Chab Dai legal support project, started in 2005 in Cambodia, and supports two lawyers to help with prosecuting those responsible for human trafficking.

Since then it has grown to include 50 staff committed to ending one of the most horrifying, degrading acts people can inflict upon others – human trafficking.

International Needs is a faith-based aid organisation that has formed strong relationships around the world with local



people committed to helping their communities leave poverty and injustice behind-uniting with Chab Dai is our answer to improving the lives of thousands imperilled by human trafficking.

Modern slavery is dragging millions around the globe into an abyss of misery and degradation. Few in New Zealand would appreciate the despair this crisis inflicts upon young, and largely female people throughout Asia and Africa. The statistics are often so large, it becomes hard to realise each number is an individual life. deserving of dignity.

Human Trafficking- the mathematics of misery:

- The 2nd largest illegal trade in the world after drugs, valued at US\$33 billion a year.
- 40 million men and women and children impacted by it globally.
- Women bear the brunt, accounting for 71% of victims
- 15 million are in forced marriages, 24 million in forced labour.
- 30% are children.

We all have a role to play, with modern slavery and forced labour touching almost all aspects of goods we buy including food, electronics, and clothes.

Chab Dai successes-finding light in the darkness.

Chab Dai finds hope and justice for victims of modern slavery within their communities and within their legal systems.

Here's how Chab Dai has helped to break the slavery chain in communities throughout Asia

Legal Support —

A father's child had been raped and he received multiple calls from the offender offering to pay compensation if it was kept out of court, and they soon became threats. But support from Chab Dai lawyers offered to the father saw the case go to court and the perpetrator sentenced.

Victim support -


Last year alone, Chab Dai repatriated 104 survivors of human trafficking back to their communities in Cambodia. Counselling services were offered for 50 survivors, 57 convictions and verdicts were achieved. and 12 human trafficking brokers were arrested.

Community support –

Chab Dai champions community heroes who stand up to human trafficking in their lives-like the village mother who was told she should marry her daughter to a wealthy Chinese man. Messages from Chab Dai Community Heroes convinced her otherwise – today she provides an example of defiance against trafficking to her fellow villagers.

Through Chab Dai, International Needs is offering hope to people caught in the degrading, desperate net of human trafficking. By supporting International Needs you too can reach out in a practical way to change the lives of international slavery's victims.

Burkina Faso children

Thank you for being a part of the "LIGHT" in Burkina Faso.

"For I was hungry, and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty, and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in..." Matthew 25:35

Late last year INNZ put out a plea to help children in Burkina Faso who had been displaced after their school was targeted by extreme terrorists. Sadly, Christians are being targeted by extremists supported by Al Qaeda cells operating in Mali and the North of the country.

Christ's Light was spread and will continue to permeate Burkina Faso, especially through our International Needs Christian School: *La Bonne Nouvelle*.

International Needs Burkina Faso (INBF) is our partner in Bobo Dioulasso; they have been implementing development programs in the Colma district of Bobo for over 20 years, ranging from basic healthcare programs, maternity support, and fighting malaria to providing between 600 - 700 pupils each year with education at La Bonne Nouvelle primary and secondary school. INBF also run evangelistic outreach programs amongst the country's unreached people groups and are currently church planting. INBF are well placed and experienced to implement sustainable change in their community.



Through New Zealand supporters' kindness and generosity to help these children and families displaced:

- A total of \$25.745 was raised
- 50 precious refugee children have been enrolled into La Bonne Nouvelle
- Each student is being given education, uniform, school equipment, a daily meal, and counselling
- Food is being distributed to the displaced children and their families
- Plans are progressing to build four new classrooms by October 2022, to cater for an additional 56 children

Here is a story from a student whose life has been changed through the "Light":

My name is Ouedraogo. Before telling you my story I would like to say thank you for your support. I am now able to continue my studies

Our village, which is 100 km from Bobo, was attacked by armed groups. My parents were able to flee with me and we found refuge in Bobo-Dioulasso. My parents lost everything we had including a field we cultivated to feed us. Without your help I would be a street child having to beg with my mother. Today you have given me the opportunity to continue my studies and to have a good future.

May God bless you.







INsight into Nepal Livelihoods

Breaking the cycle of poverty alone is virtually impossible, but when a community comes together supported through our Livelihoods Programme, we can help raise the household incomes of families living in poverty, in a sustainable way.

You can support families in breaking this cycle — transforming lives for generations.

International Needs provides communities with the resources and education to become self-supporting through our Livelihoods Programme, empowering them to find local long-term solutions to poverty.

International Needs launched the Livelihoods Programme in Sindhupalchowk district as a response to the 2015 earthquake. Sindhupalchowk was among one of the most badly impacted areas, with many families losing everything.

The aim of the programme is to support families affected by the earthquake to rebuild their livelihoods and create new sources of income. Through the programme, families receive support through resource provision such as tools and livestock. They are also supported with vocational skills training and finances to build their own small businesses. Individuals and households are given the choice of how their families are supported. Many elect for livestock support to start their own farming businesses, others opt for skills training and resources to begin their own furniture making businesses and other trades. We are also working to develop community support groups to provide more skills training, and producers' groups to build the capacity of farmers to sell their produce.

We are currently working with three hillside villages in Sindhupalchowk supporting families. Our goal is to extend this programme to reach more individuals with resources and training which is changing lives.
