

INsight into Street children in Bangladesh

"They are born on the streets, pass life on the streets and eventually die on the streets".

This statement from a report into the life of street children in Bangladesh seems like a dramatic way to start this article, however for many children living on the streets it is a fact of life. If you asked the roughly 450,000 children living on the streets in Dhaka, Bangladesh's capital, how many have lost a parent, the amount would astound anyone.

There are many reasons children are forced to live on the streets including: abandonment due to poverty or neglect, drug and alcohol abuse, physical abuse and of course, death of one or both parents. Once a child is abandoned onto the streets, they are a lot more vulnerable to abuse, sexual assaults. forced labour and slavery, and death.

For Tuhin, sadly, his life dramatically changed because of the death of his father in a road accident. After the accident, his mother couldn't provide for the family and Tuhin was forced to live on the streets. Tuhin managed to gain work by repairing bicycles for minimal amounts of money and long hours which, in turn, has given him a look of stress that a man six times his age would wear.

This life of emptiness and striving to stay alive doesn't give a lot of room for planning for a future. However, we can give that opportunity. By giving street children, like Tuhin, a basic education, a meal and counselling every day, they can have a chance for a future. The Drop-in Centre in Dhaka is a ray of light that can end the cycle of living and then dying on the street.

It's hard to imagine any situation where we would have to force a child into bonded labour just to keep our family from starving. Surely, we would do anything we can to keep our family safe and fed but what if





anything wasn't enough? What would you do if there was no way of earning enough for your family to be fed? This is the sad reality of many parents who live in Dhaka, Bangladesh.

The Drop-in Centre is accessible for children who are unable to attend full time school. Located adjacent to the Bangladesh garment industry's hub, the Centre provides a safe and enriching environment where children receive nutritious food, education. social and psychological support, recreational activities, healthcare services, bathing facilities, and legal aid, if necessary.

Your gift will provide healthcare to street children who are unable to pay for medical care or nutritious food. It will also provide for psychological support for those struggling with alcohol or drug abuse, anxiety, or depression, social support and recreational activities, and education so the children can learn to read, write, and do simple math. INsight into Covid Relief

"We, the poor, are immune from the coronavirus" was a quote from a governor in Mexico at the start of the pandemic. As time has now taught us, he couldn't have been more wrong. This virus has affected the poor disproportionality more than the wealthy.

We have seen countless times on the news the devastation that Covid-19 has had on our world.

Many lives have been lost, millions of people being displaced, children forced into early childhood marriage or work; the list goes on.

However, we have also seen more than just glimmers of hope... we have seen Christ's hands and feet working tirelessly amongst the 'least of these' to bring about transformation and change alongside hope that is found in knowing Jesus.

It was tough to share the news of our friends and the situations that they faced. Many of our partners lost loved ones or staff members, and the impact was felt deeply within their communities and even here in New Zealand. However, we praise God for what they have also been able to achieve during this time.



India – Over the last four months, more than 4,000 families were fed through providing emergency food

hampers and providing much needed medical supplies to help those who were in need, suffering and recovering from the impacts of Covid-19. Our friends in India are still working closely with the local communities to ensure food, shelter and protective equipment is provided to those in need.



Uganda – Whilst Covid-19 closed many schools throughout the country, Justus and his team managed to help

a number of students continue their studies with online learning and by providing workbooks for other students to take home and continue their studies where they live.









Fiji – Covid-19 has decimated the island nation of Fiji. Many Fijians have felt the effects in some way, whether it be

through loss of life, income, or livelihood. Not a single person came away without some form of impact. Tomu and his team partnered not only with International Needs New Zealand, but also the New Zealand Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MFAT), the French Embassy, Tourism Fiji, and other businesses to provide much needed aid and support to those in need. They fed many families with food aid and provided temporary shelters to those in need. Whilst the Solo Mums' programme has been delayed, this has not stopped the team from making a difference in their local community.



Bangladesh & Nepal – Both capital cities of these nations have been in and out of lockdowns throughout the

year which has had devastating effects on the people who rely on day to day living. Many families continue to suffer and feel the effects of these lockdowns which have forced many back to the rural villages. To prevent ongoing social issues that this may bring, our partners at International Needs Nepal & Bangladesh, have been working with local communities to develop sustainable livelihood programmes such as vegetable growing and goat farming. Helping many families to grow their own food has been instrumental in making changes in these remote rural communities.





Philippines –Through the working of the 18 church planters, many families were helped with food aid and

support over the last few months. Covid-19 has ravaged the Philippines and the main city of Manilla is in and out of lockdowns, having major effects on those trying to earn a living. Not only were families fed, but many children in rural villages were able to continue their studies online through the generosity of New Zealanders in providing Wi-Fi extenders and smart devices so that they can stay connected and not fall behind.

We still believe education is the best way to bring people out of poverty. Education, coupled with tools and resources to give people a hand up, not a handout, will see many lives being transformed and changed for the better.

INsight into Livelihood Programmes

It's nearly impossible to climb out of poverty alone, but when a community comes together, their many hands help to lift each other up. Through Livelihood Programmes, we aim to raise the household income of families living in poverty in a sustainable way.

The Livelihood Programme beneficiaries form self-help groups so they work together in their communities to help one another to transform not only their own lives but also those of their community. This also means when new beneficiaries are chosen, they get supported by a group of people who already have experience and can therefore get their gardens established. Livelihood intervention programmes help in many other areas too, such as prevention of child labour, slavery, or trafficking. It also gives local communities a sense of worth and wellbeing that they are empowered to look after themselves and not be reliant on continuous aid.

Thank you to everyone who donated to the Seeds of Hope appeal. The impact of the livelihood projects is growing rapidly and here are some of the successes from IN Nepal's Livelihood Pilot project. Participants of the Pilot programme were provided with 10 varieties of vegetable seeds, along with training on vegetable cultivation and equipment, to enable them to establish their own gardens.

Training was also undertaken on how to construct polytunnels. These tunnels will allow families to grow a wider variety of vegetables and extend ability to grow crops across colder parts of the year. This will help families to provide food for their

own use and has the potential for additional income by selling any of the surplus vegetables that are grown.

Indra Bahadur lives with his wife, two daughters and three grandchildren. He shared "Now we have varieties of vegetables in our own garden no one is hesitating to cook a meal for the family".





Maya Tamang lives with her husband and son. Her husband is a labourer, and she has been involved in the IN Nepal Livelihood Programme both with rearing goats and growing vegetables.

"I have been enjoying the training around cultivating different varieties of vegetables from the IN Livelihood Programme. I am now making some income which is making our family life easy"

INsight into Medical Centres

It is hard to fathom the personal tragedy of having to choose between buying food and life-saving medicine for your child. It is harder still to grasp the vast scale of how many families must face this dilemma, year after year.

According to the World Health
Organisation, half of the world's population
are still unable to readily access essential
health services. For up to 100 million
people, the cost of basic healthcare puts
their family at material risk of being pushed
into extreme poverty.

Two of the medical centres we support in Uganda and Burkina Faso provide a wide range of affordable health care services. These centres protect lives but also give hope for the future.

They provide a lifeline for families, so they no longer must choose between life-saving medicine or food and instead receive

treatment that enables people to stay at work and earn a living.

The team at International Needs St Ophel Medical Centre in Bobo-Dioulasso, Burkina Faso, and International Needs Makonge Community Health Centre in Kiyindi, Uganda, work tirelessly to tackle this dilemma and help families gain access to adequate and lifesaving medical care.

Dieudonne, the Director of International Needs Burkina Faso, shares that "the Health Programme at the Medical Centre is helping the government of Burkina Faso to provide a better quality of care to the vulnerable population, and this is possible thanks to your donations and multiform support. May God bless you!"

Both these clinics have not only been crucial in the recent fight against COVID-19 but also other life-threatening viruses and illnesses such as malaria and typhoid.

Malaria continues to be a very common illness in patients treated. The clinics offer a range of essential medical services including maternity services where women receive follow-up care during pregnancy, childbirth and after childbirth.

INsight into fresh water for Nepal

"Water, water everywhere, but not a drop to drink"

In many of the remote and rural areas of Nepal, people drink directly from the sources like rivers, springs, and ponds. These open sources of water are polluted and contaminated.

Many of these water sources also dry up in winter.

Such polluted water is the main cause for water-borne diseases like dysentery, typhoid, and cholera. Every year many infants, children and adults become victims of these diseases.

This highlighted the need for International Needs Nepal, with the support of International Needs New Zealand, to help communities access safe and clean water through the installation of water wells.

Through the generosity of supporters, we have been able to see whole communities transformed

by having access to safe drinking water through the International Needs WASH (water) programme.

Many lives are being saved and water borne diseases prevented. Last year along through IN Nepal WASH programme, over 1,400 people gained access to safe, clean drinking water.

Currently we are looking to raise funds for the construction of three more





water wells in the district of Kavare, ward #6 of Panchkhal Municipality, central Nepal. Each water well costs approximately \$5,000 to construct. These wells will service 170 households, more than 300 individuals! Local workers are employed to dig the 25 metre wells by hand and the project is overseen by our partners at International Needs Nepal.

As a sponsored child, Gertrude dreamt of becoming a teacher once she had finished her schooling. Through the support of generous donors to the International Needs Uganda Tertiary Fund, her dream is now becoming a reality.

In July, Gertrude graduated with a degree in teaching. In the future she would like to do further study, including completing her master's so she can become a lecturer and learn sign language.

Gertrude wrote a heartfelt thank you letter to one couple in New Zealand who supported her through this fund. Here is a snippet of the letter:

"Thank you very much. You have changed my world. We are two children in my family and my big brother did not study so my degree is the first degree of my family. You have made me a woman of importance and an inspiration to many. I promise to show people the same heart that you have shown me. Stay Blessed. Thank You!"

Gertrude is currently teaching Economics and Geography at Kings College Buddo Secondary School which is one of the best and most prestigious schools in Uganda. This is the school where most of the country's leaders and influential people have passed through.

Gertrude is transforming the lives of many young children at the college every day. Recently she even went and spoke with the First Lady of Uganda (Mrs. Janet

Museveni) to advocate for nine airls who were on the verge of missing university education because thev couldn't raise the tuition fees due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Her discussion was successful, and the nine girls were given tuition support by the government of Uganda through the First Lady. Praise God!





Gertrude also met with the Speaker of Uganda's parliament, the Right Honourable Rebecca Kadaga, on advocacy issues and was also successful.

Gertrude's story is one of true inspiration and transformation. Child sponsorship truly is the key to unlocking a future full of hope and prosperity — a future filled with opportunity and void of poverty.
